


We are now hard at work creating a database, in order to have a better and more efficient management of memberships. We hope to have it soon in working order.

All our meetings are held on the 3rd Monday of every month, from March through November, at the William G. Best Masonic Temple, located at calle Canelones 1429, Montevideo.



# **MEDICAL COLUMN**



**Time** can be viewed as a moment (chrónos), an opportunity (kairós), as relative in Einstein's theory, as an existential dimension in Heidegger's philosophy, or as the crude zerosum game of grassroots daily experience. In healthcare, all involved: physicians, nurses, other professionals, administrative support staff, C-suiters and patients, can experience time in any or all of the ways described above, but everyday reality makes us dependent on the zero-sum game. Time - and the lack of it - make healthcare on all sides of the table a competition between alternatives: if we do one thing we can't do another at the same time. Patients have to book, queue and wait to obtain services they want or need; providers have to balance the demands of fixed schedules with the pressure to also be available for competing potentially

priorities. One-sizeurgent fits-all fixed appointment slots create the illusion of time-saving efficiency and productivity, only to be overturned by unexpected (or expected but ignored) needs that may be either more urgent more complex than the assembly-line model we're all hooked on can satisfy.

The problem of the lack

of time, either in the form of limited provision of services in a less than 24/7 mode or as the progressively scarce number of trained professionals to provide them, has many major health systems in the developed world (the UK's NHS is an excellent example) against the ringropes. The demands of an ageing population (Uruguay is one of the 'oldest' countries in Latin America), the medicalisation of psychosocial issues, plus the reality that chronic illnesses are progressively more prevalent (diabetes, cardiovascular respiratory and diseases. cancer, allergies) lock us all more and more in the zero-sum game. Presently, the NHS is debating the need to provide 7-day access to clinics (surgeries) and weekend availability of consultants in hospitals, pitting government and professional associations against each other, with below-the-waist punching in social media.

Stretching limited resources may be like pulling the ends of bedcovers, leaving services already at their full capacity... naked.

Many professionals, scholars, news media and the public have proposed solutions. None is probably going to be magical, but I'm most attuned to those which propose maximising the availability, access and time of primary care providers (family physicians, GPs, general internists, paediatricians, qualified nurses, mental health and social service professionals). Present-day information and communications technology can be used to break the assemblyline productivity model as the one-size-fits-all method of providing care. Patients, especially when empowered to 'own' their health care, should be the main champions of the changes that must happen. It may mean that entrenched

assumptions will have to adapt or go, conflicts of interest must be made evident and transparent and that turf battles will be part of the inevitable background (or onstage) noise.

Humanity and civilisation as we know it is changing: we see it in a volatile economy, border conflicts all over the political place, and social

unrest, the constant threat of terrorism and the use of violence in all its forms as a mode of expression. Organised healthcare depends on the fabric of the society in which it exists and the present models we have inherited from the 20th century, with the emphasis on specialisation and technology are being challenged by the problems of access and availability imposed by changes in epidemiology, ageing and culture. The concept of time as a zero-sum game is self-defeating. The ancient Greeks (and the present ones in the hard way too!) differentiated two types of time as the moment (chrónos, what clocks show) and opportunity (kairós). We must grab the opportunity to redesign our healthcare systems to maximise the time patients and their primary providers interact. It won't happen by tweaking at the edges.

Initially, appointments will be available for medical specialities that are in greatest demand, including:

- -General Medicine
- -Paediatrics
- -Gynaecology & Obstetrics
- -Dermatology
- -Ophthalmology
- -Ear, Nose & Throat (ORL)
- -Cardiology
- -Psychiatry (adults and children)

# **CAROLINE'S COOKING CORNER**

#### **Jacket potatoes**

#### Ingredients

2 medium-sized floury potatoes 200 g cheddar cheese 1/2 onion (minced) 20 g butter 200 g beans in tomato sauce (one small tin) Soft cheese (to serve as dip) Salt

#### Instructions

- 1. Preheat your oven to 220°C.
- 2. Wash the potatoes well (do not peel!), and prick each in a couple of places with a fork. Allow to dry slightly, while you tip your salt into a shallow bowl. Roll each potato in the salt to give an even coating. This will give a crisp skin. Avoid cooking them in foil.
- 3. Place on the middle shelf of the oven, preferably directly on the rack. Cook for around an hour, and then give them a squeeze the potato should just give, and the skin should be distinctly crisp. If not, leave them for 10 more minutes, and check again if you overcook them, the insides will be dry, so it's important to be vigilant.



- 4. Take them out of the oven. Make a cross in the top with a sharp knife and firmly press each potato, holding it in a tea towel, so that it opens at all four points.
- 5. Put some cold butter in the middle. Sprinkle the minced onion and grate some cheddar cheese on top. Put the potatoes back in the oven for 3-4 minutes. While you wait for the cheese to melt, pour the beans in tomato sauce onto the plate. Take the potatoes out of the oven and place them in the sauce. Enjoy with some soft cheese on the side.
